Writing requires a diverse range of vocabulary to construct varied sentences, while reading demands an understanding of the multiple meanings of words depending on their context within sentences.*

The study participants were Management students from the fourth and sixth semesters.

Descriptive analysis was conducted for each variable to assess students' English proficiency. Linear regression analysis was used to examine the impact of independent variables on the dependent variable, while moderating regression analysis was applied to evaluate the moderating effect. The findings confirmed that vocabulary had a significant positive influence on writing skills. Additionally, reading skills moderated the relationship between vocabulary and writing skills. Future research can explore experimental studies on vocabulary, writing, and reading.

Therefore, vocabulary plays a vital role in learning English, serving as a foundation for both writing and reading proficiency. This research aims to examine the impact of vocabulary mastery on English writing skills. Additionally, it explores whether reading ability moderates this relationship by either strengthening or weakening the connection. The study employed moderated regression analysis as its primary method and utilized tests as research instruments. These instruments were verified to be both valid and reliable.

Using specific, clear words—such as active verbs, concrete nouns, and well-chosen adjectives—ensures that readers grasp the message of the sentences. Essentially, word choice involves selecting words that best support the purpose of the text, taking into account each word's exact meaning, connotations, and denotations.

Critical thinking is vital in academic settings because it empowers you to analyze texts, evaluate evidence, construct logical arguments, and grasp complex concepts—ultimately leading to improved academic performance. In practice, thinking critically means applying reason and logic to evaluate arguments and draw your own conclusions<sup>21</sup>. Rather than simply reciting facts or providing textbook responses, critical thinking encourages you to explore deeper, allowing you get to the core of your own beliefs and ideas.

#### *Enhancing creativity and word*

Multi-meaning vocabulary allows for wordplay, metaphors, and double meaning that make writing more engaging and imaginative. Writers can use polysemous words to create puns, jokes, and rhetorical effects that capture readers’ interest. For instance, in poetry or advertising, a phrase like “a bright future” plays on the multiple meanings of “bright” (both intelligent and full of light/hope). Word play refers to the creative manipulation of language—experimenting with words, sounds, meanings, and associations—to discover new ways to express ideas. In vocabulary instruction, it’s crucial because it actively engages students with new words, moving beyond merely seeing, hearing, or repeating them<sup>22</sup>. When students play with words, they interact with language in a meaningful way, making it more likely that the vocabulary will become an integral part of their daily lives. This is especially important given that many students already struggle with limited vocabularies, and without explicit, engaging instruction, these gaps tend to widen over time. Ultimately, word play helps deepen understanding and retention, supporting overall reading and writing.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Multi-meaning vocabulary is powerful tool for enhancing writing skills. By expanding word choice, encouraging critical, fostering creativity, and improving academic and professional writing, polysemous words enable writers to craft more effective and engaging

However, a limitation of this research is that the test was conducted online during the pandemic, which may have affected the accuracy of the results. The findings confirm that vocabulary has a significant positive impact on writing skills. A person with an extensive vocabulary can express ideas more freely and effectively in written form. Reading skills play a moderating role in the relationship between vocabulary and writing skills. This means that individuals who develop strong reading habits are likely to enhance their vocabulary, which in turn improves their writing ability.

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
