

## PARENTS MOTIVATION FOR INVOLVEMENT IN CHILDREN'S EDUCATION

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### ABSTRACT:

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*This article describes the significance of the motivation that is provided by parents to their children. The main goal of this article is to explain how the parental motivation is important for children's education and success. The survey was conducted among students in order to know how their parents' motivation is vital for them and how they can rate their parents' attention to them*

**INTRODUCTION.** This passage highlights the crucial role parents play in their children's academic journey. It emphasizes that active parental involvement significantly impacts not only the academic performance of children but also their motivation and overall well-being. Parents who engage with teachers, assist with schoolwork, and maintain a proactive role in their children's education help create an environment conducive to learning and personal growth.

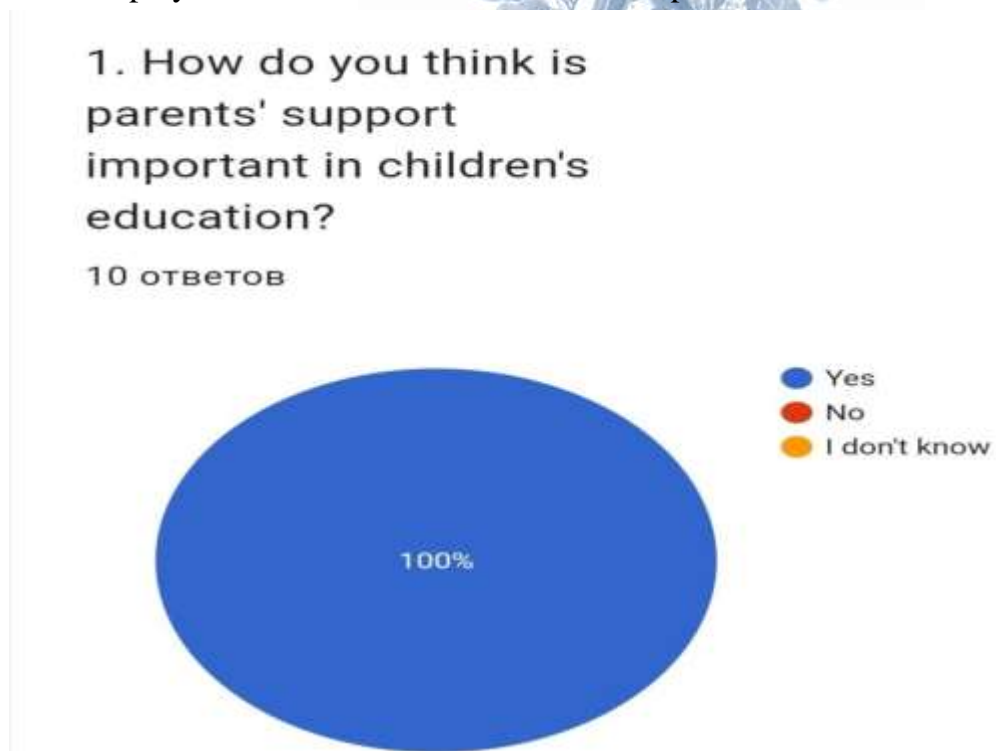
Conversely, the passage also draws attention to the concerning lack of involvement from some parents, which can negatively affect a child's educational experience. The reference to Adri Manhire and Edith H. Hoge's (2010) study reinforces the importance of parental participation, underlining that it positively influences a child's success and attitude toward education. This insight urges both educators and communities to encourage and support parental engagement in schools, recognizing it as a vital component of educational and environmental transformation.

### METHODS AND ANALYSIS

The participants of this survey were second-year students from the Uzbekistan State World Languages University. The purpose of our review study was to gain deeper insight into the significance of parental motivation in children's development, particularly the relationship between maternal involvement and children's academic achievement. Additionally, the study aimed to identify effective practices and explore the unique challenges faced by illiterate parents.

To achieve this, we designed a questionnaire consisting of eight questions. Seven of the questions required respondents to select the answer they most agreed with, while the final question asked them to provide a written response.

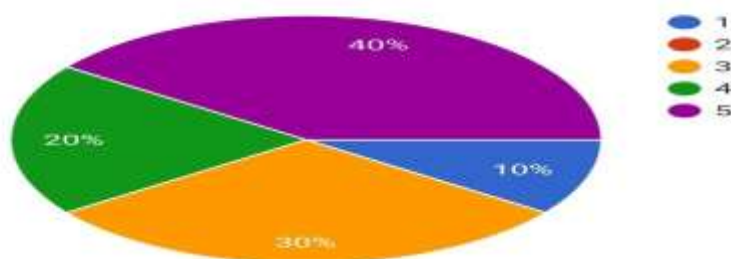
Notably, all participants unanimously agreed in response to the first question that parental motivation plays a crucial role in children's development..



In the second question, on a scale 1-5 they answered how much they thought parents could help in motivating their children. Surprisingly, only 10% of the participants answered that it was being the highest and 40% of them answered that it was being the lowest. Besides, other 20% and 30% of respondents answered that it was being neither the highest nor the lowest, it was being in the middle.

2. On a scale of 1-5, how much do you think parents can help in motivating their children in your country? (1 being the lowest and 5 being the highest)

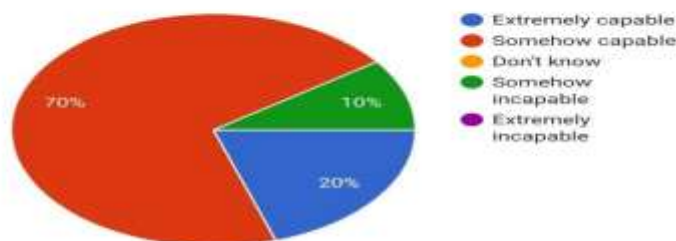

In the third question, participants answered to what level they agreed that parents were capable of dealing with their children's emotions appropriately. Most respondents (70%) answered that parents were somehow capable of dealing while 20% of them answered that parents were extremely capable. Only 20% of them responded that parents are somehow incapable.

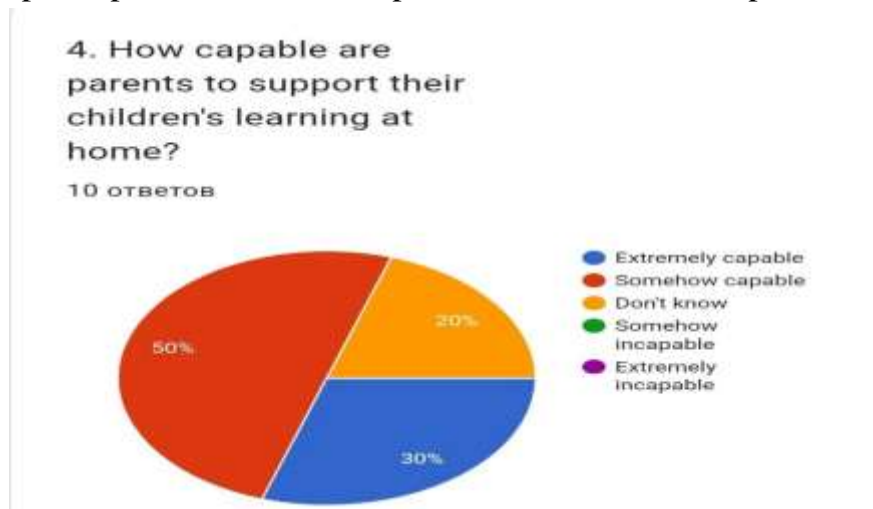
3. To what level do you agree that parents are capable of dealing with their children's emotions appropriately?

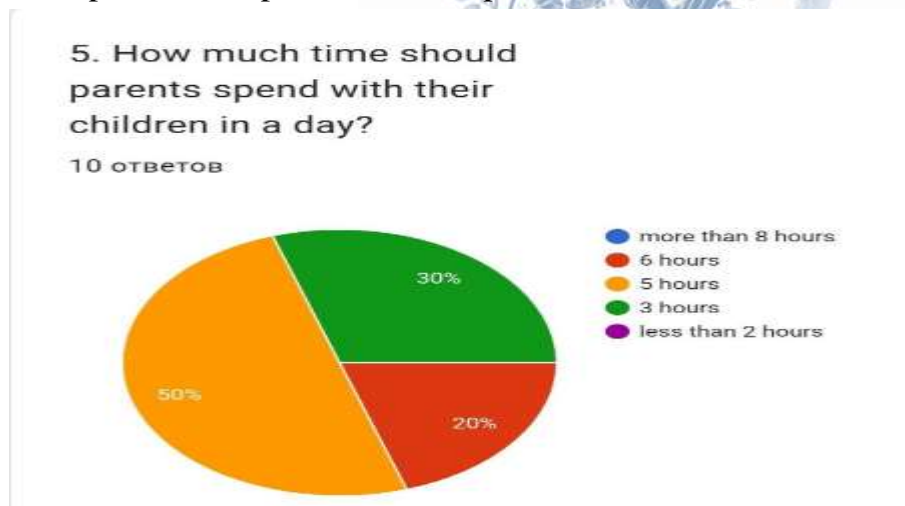


In the fourth question, respondents answered how parents were capable to support their children's learning at home. Astonishingly, only 30% of the students responded that they

were extremely capable. Besides, 20% of them answered that they did not know and 50% of the participants answered that parents were somehow capable.



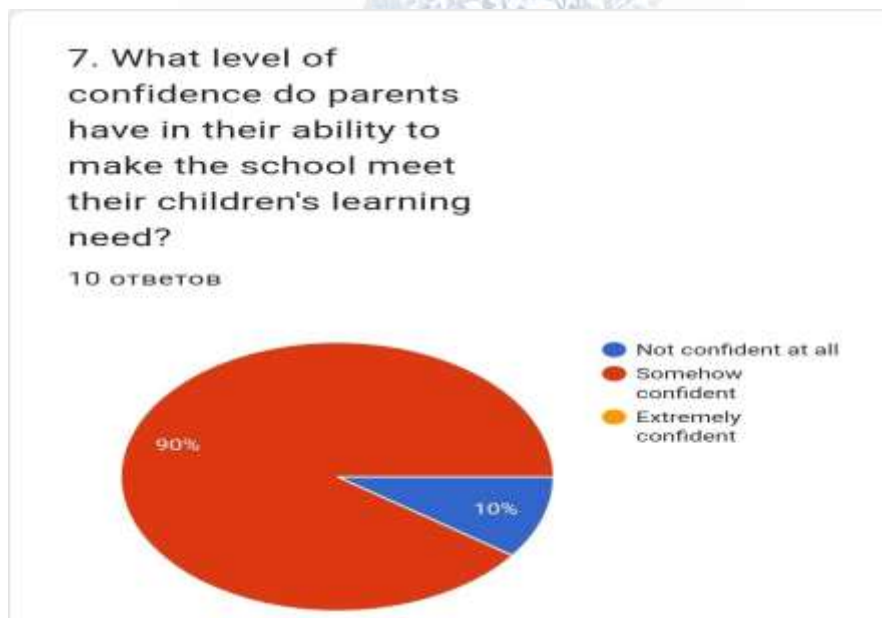
In the fifth questions, students answered how much time parents should spend with their children in a day. Remarkably, 30% of them answered that 3 hours is enough for a day, while 20% of them thought that parents should spend 6 hours in a day. And other 50% of them responded that parents should spent 5 hours.



In the sixth question, on a scale 1-5 participants rated parents in their country for the ability to make decisions about their children's education. Surprisingly, none of them rated

parents' ability like being the highest, while 10% of the respondents rated their ability like being the lowest. Besides, 40% of the students rated like being somehow low and other 50% students thought that parents' ability was normal.

In the penultimate question, respondents answered what level of confidence parents had in their ability to make the school meet their children's learning need. Most of them (90%) thought that parents were somehow confident, while 10% of them thought that they were not confident at all.



In the last question, the participants gave their own opinion about parents' motivation for involvement in children's education. Most of them answered that parents can be a good example for their kids, from the early ages they need to motivate children to read books, not to waste their time.

### DISCUSSION

This study emphasizes the importance of parental involvement and encouragement in children's academic progress and emotional well-being. The key findings are as follows:

1. Impact of Parental Support: There is a strong link between parental encouragement and children's academic performance. Children with supportive parents tend to achieve better results than those without such motivation.

2. Declining Parental Engagement: The study points to a decline in the time parents spend with their children, which negatively impacts their academic motivation. Children believe that parents should spend at least three hours daily engaging with them.

3. Motivational Strategies: Parents can enhance their children's drive for success by employing structured strategies and rewards, fostering greater determination and academic achievement.

4. Mutual Benefits of Success: Parental motivation not only boosts children's success but also inspires parents as they witness their children's accomplishments, creating a cycle of encouragement and achievement.

**Conclusion.** Parental involvement is crucial for children's academic success and emotional resilience. Parents should actively support their children, particularly when they face difficulties in their studies, as young learners may struggle to stay motivated. By consistently encouraging their children, parents can foster persistence and contribute significantly to their long-term success.

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
